

Are there national standards for composite optical cables

Article Overview

Yes, composite optical cables are subject to national standards, primarily under the U.S. National Electrical Code (NEC) Article 770, which governs optical fiber cables including those combined with electrical conductors.

NEC Standards

In the United States, composite optical cables--cables that combine optical fibers with current-carrying conductors--are regulated under NEC Article 770. These cables can only be used where the optical fibers and electrical conductors are functionally associated [770.133(A)] and must comply with the general requirements of Chapters 1 through 4 of the NEC, including proper installation, support, and protection [770.24, 770.21] . NEC Article 770 also specifies:

- o Separation requirements: Conductive fiber-optic cables must be separated from other cables to prevent interference and ensure safety .
- o Raceway and support rules: Cables must be installed in a neat and workmanlike manner, using straps, hangers, or cable ties that do not damage the cable .
- o Outdoor and building entry: Part II of Article 770 covers cables entering buildings, including restrictions on placement in environmental air spaces and requirements for metallic or non-metallic raceways .

International Standards

Beyond the NEC, ITU-T G-series Recommendations provide guidance on the transmission characteristics, environmental performance, and material properties of optical fibers and cables, including single-mode fibers used in composite cables . While ITU-T standards are international, they are often referenced in national regulations and industry specifications.
