- o **Depth and Volume:** Deeper boxes allow more internal space for wire splices, reducing overcrowding and improving safety. NEC guidelines recommend selecting boxes with adequate volume for the number and gauge of conductors .
- o **Internal vs External Dimensions:** Catalog dimensions usually list external height x width x depth. Internal usable space is slightly smaller due to wall thickness, mounting hardware, and door returns .
- o **Future Expansion:** Adding 20-30% extra space is recommended for airflow, heat dissipation, and potential upgrades .
- o **Material and Rating:** Plastic, metal, or FRP boxes may vary slightly in size. Ensure the box meets environmental and safety ratings (IP or NEMA) for the intended location .
