- o Gate placement: Gates should swing away from the front of the box to avoid blocking access .

- o Metal fences: Strong and durable but conductive; require careful placement to avoid electrical hazards .
- o Wood fences: Non-conductive and easy to customize; may require maintenance over time .
- o Composite or fiberglass fences: Lightweight, non-conductive, and low-maintenance; suitable for utility and substation applications .

- o Locate all underground and above-ground utilities before digging post holes by contacting local utility services (e.g., 811 in the U.S.) .
- o Ensure gates or removable panels provide unimpeded access for maintenance and emergency personnel .
- o Follow local building codes and utility company guidelines for setbacks, height, and materials .
- o Consider aesthetics and security: Fences can also prevent vandalism, restrict unauthorized access, and blend
