

How to bundle the fiber optic terminal box

- o Labeling: Clearly label each fiber and port to simplify future maintenance and troubleshooting .

Step 5: Secure and Protect

- o Cable ties or tubing: Use provided cable ties or tubing to bundle fibers without over-tightening, which could damage the fibers .
- o Close the box: Ensure the terminal box is properly closed and sealed, especially for outdoor installations, to protect against dust, moisture, and physical damage .

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Step 6: Test and Inspect

- o Signal testing: Use a fiber power meter or OTDR to verify signal integrity after bundling.
 - o Visual inspection: Check that fibers are stable, loops are neat, and no sharp bends or entanglements exist .
