Aerial fiber optic cable refers to a kind of fiber optic cable that is designed and used for outside plant (OSP) installation between poles by being lashed to a wire rope messenger strand with

The strand of fibre optic cable is very fragile, and is protected by a buffer tube. This is a somewhat flexible plastic, and is coloured to so technicians can identify each buffer tube in a cable.

Vertical zones on joint poles are dedicated to various power distribution, cable and telephone service uses, usually in descending order.

Fiber optic cable can be made completely without conductive contents, which allows installation near power conductors. Utilities began using fiber optics almost as
