

Is mobile fiber optic cable safe

Mobile fiber optic cables are generally safe for the public, as they emit no radiation or electrical current, but handling them improperly can pose physical and chemical hazards.

Public Safety

The glass core can produce microscopic shards if cut or broken, which can puncture the skin, cause irritation, or lead to infection . These shards are difficult to see and can be accidentally inhaled or ingested, potentially causing internal injuries. Technicians must follow strict safety protocols, including using adhesive tape or specialized containers to dispose of fragments and avoiding eating or drinking near exposed fibers .

Light Exposure

The infrared light used in fiber optics is invisible to the human eye, which removes natural protective reflexes like blinking. Looking directly into the end of a live or disconnected fiber can damage the cornea, lens, or retina . Proper safety measures include using power meters to ensure the line is non-transmitting and employing infrared filters on inspection equipment.

Chemical Risks

During installation and splicing, technicians may use cleaning agents, solvents, and adhesives. While the solid cable materials are inert, prolonged or repeated exposure to these chemicals without proper ventilation or protective gear can cause respiratory or skin irritation .

Safety Guidelines

To ensure safe handling, fiber optic technicians follow OSHA regulations, National Electrical Safety Code (NESC), and company safety practices . Key rules include proper training, use of personal protective equipment, and adherence to local and federal safety standards.
