

The pigtail is not properly inserted

Article Overview

If a pigtail catheter is not properly inserted, it may be malpositioned, kinked, or not fully within the pleural cavity, and requires careful assessment and correction.

Common Causes of Improper Insertion

- o Incomplete advancement: The pigtail may not be inserted far enough to place all fenestrations within the pleural space, reducing drainage efficiency ().
- o Kinking or obstruction: The catheter can bend during insertion, especially if the guidewire or dilator is not properly aligned ().
- o Incorrect trajectory: Insertion too far laterally, posteriorly, or at the wrong intercostal space can prevent proper placement ().
- o Resistance during dilation: Forcing the dilator without twisting or feeling for loss of resistance can misplace the catheter ().

Steps to Verify Placement

- o Check guidewire mobility: Ensure the guidewire moves freely through the catheter before final insertion ().
- o Confirm fenestration location: Advance the pigtail until resistance is felt, then pull back slightly to ensure all holes are within the pleural cavity ().
- o Use imaging: A chest X-ray is essential to confirm correct positioning and rule out complications like pneumothorax or malposition ().
- o Functional check: For pneumothorax, attach a one-way valve or underwater seal and observe for air bubbles during patient cough to confirm drainage ().

Corrective Measures

- o Repositioning: If malpositioned, gently withdraw or advance the catheter under sterile conditions and imaging guidance ().
- o Replace if necessary: If the catheter is kinked or cannot be repositioned, remove and reinsert using proper Seldinger technique ().
- o Ensure secure fixation: Suture the catheter and apply an occlusive dressing to prevent dislodgement ().

Prevention Tips

- o Use ultrasound guidance for effusions or difficult anatomy to reduce malposition risk ().
- o Insert the catheter over the guidewire with the obturator fully in place, then remove the obturator gradually while advancing the pigtail ().
- o Always advance until resistance is felt, then confirm with imaging before connecting to drainage (). Proper
