

What to do if fiber gets into the melting tray

If fiber accidentally enters the melting tray, carefully remove it, avoid contamination, and ensure it is properly protected before resuming the fusion process.

Immediate Steps

- o **Power Off or Pause the Heater:** Before touching the fiber, ensure the heating element is off or the splicer is paused to prevent burns or further damage to the fiber .

- o **Regular Maintenance:** Clean the V-groove, electrodes, and heating tray regularly to prevent debris from causing fiber misplacement or contamination .
- o **Organize Fibers in the Tray:** Use cable ties or spiral wraps to secure unused fibers and prevent them from sliding into the heating area . By following these steps, you can safely remove fiber from the melting tray, prevent damage, and maintain high-quality splicing results.
